Swift Sits Set for Sept. 10, 16

CA's 8th annual Chimney Swift Sit will be held Saturday, Sept. 10, at 6:30 p.m. at the Village Hall 102 S 2nd St. in W. 15 p.m. at the Village Hall, 102 S. 2nd St., in West Dundee.

There's plenty of street parking along 2nd Street and free city parking across the street. Bring a lawn chair if you wish. Some 826 Swifts entered the chimney at the hall on Wednesday night, Sept. 6, so there should be a good show Saturday.

A second sit will be held Friday, Sept. 16, at 6:30 p.m. at a location to be announced.

Chimney Swifts are gathering in large groups as they migrate to South America. The Swift Sit is a family-friendly event to watch one of these groups as they roost for the evening. The show begins slowly about 20 minutes before sunset. Hundreds of these cigar-shaped birds will fly around a chimney opening. At first, one or two birds will drop in, but then, eventually, the flock will form a funnel and begin pouring into the chimney en masse. It's an amazing spectacle!

You do not need to be a KCA member to attend. Binoculars are optional because Swifts are visible with the naked eye as they enter the chimney.

KCA Walks Record 262 Species to Date

In 2020, KCA had 41 trips and rambles and saw a total of 168 bird species. In 2021, we had 45 trips and rambles and saw 173 species. Those were COVID years, and we limited participation and the number of trips we offered. As a result, we didn't get as many birds as we used to.

This year, we are making up for lost time! Through Sept. 3, KCA has held 54 bird walks and rambles this year. Those outings have yielded an amazing 262 species! To be fair, we did have a long distance trip to Washington State, which added 69 birds for the year (as well as 9 birds to KCA's life list).

But, our walks here in Kane County always get good totals. Our bird walk at Dick Young Forest Preserve in Batavia on Sept. 3 recorded a whopping 63 species. Among them were 13 warblers, including Ovenbird, which was new for KCA's year list. Kudos to leader Tim Klimowski and the 11 other KCAers who birded with him.

Thankfully, our trips and rambles no longer have any limits on the number of participants, so all are welcome. Look at our calendar of events and see how many more trips we have for the year and come join us. It feels great to return to a somewhat "normal" trip activity. We have often had new birders join us on our walks, and I think they all have enjoyed the experience of being with birders that are more than willing to answer questions and help newcomers feel welcome.

Fall Global Big Day Set for Oct. 8

ark your calendars for the fall edition of Global Big Day Saturday, Oct. 8. By taking part in October Big Day, you're also Lipining the second-ever Global Bird Weekend and celebrating World Migratory Bird Day. Be a part of the global team and help set a new record for birding!

You can bird anywhere you like for as long as you like from midnight to 11:59 p.m. The idea is to create a snapshot of bird populations around the world on a particular day. Last year on October Big Day, 32,670 birders worldwide turned in 78,024 checklists with a grand total of 7,269 species.

Participation is easy:

- Watch birds on Oct. 8.
- Enter your sightings on eBird.
- Watch the sightings roll in in real-time on the eBird October Big Day page: https://ebird.org/octoberbigday. If you don't know how to use eBird, contact me, and I will help you set up an account.

An Australian Birding Year, by R. Bruce Richardson


E ver thought of taking a year off and birding nonstop for a year? Now, how about doing that in a camper with your less enthusiastic significant other. R. Bruce Richardson did just that in Australia. Both he and his wife, Lynn, are Americans who live in Australia. R. Bruce is a passionate birder. He could go 24 hours a day. His wife enjoys birding on a more limited basis. They spent the year in a camper moving from place to place, occasionally staying in motels or cabins when the need for a little space apart became overwhelming. Each day, they searched for whatever birds were in the area. They were never bored!

They finished the year with 640 birds they saw together. Along the way, they discovered the amazing country, people and wildlife that live in their newly adopted home. The book is sprinkled liberally with photos of the awesome birds and places they saw.

This is more than just the story of the birds seen. He goes into details of the day-to-day trials and tribulations when you are trying to see as many birds as possible while covering huge distances dealing with weather, mechanical challenges, and difficult and amazing people.

R. Bruce has an engaging personality and does not spare himself when telling his story. His first book was so successful he has another one coming out in January.

More Than 10,000 Swifts Recorded on 'Swift Night Out'

The annual Swift Night Out was Sept. 2-4, and it was another successful event.

Some 26 birders—including five first-time observers—watched 18 chimneys throughout Kane County. Thirteen were found to be active roosts. The total number of Chimney Swifts counted going to roost during the three-night period was 10,700. Some 76 percent of the active roosts were chimneys at business locations. The remaining 34 percent were chimneys at either schools or churches.

Wednesday, Sept. 14, 7 p.m., Annual Photo Sharing Night Hickory Knolls Discovery Center, St. Charles.

One of our most popular meetings returns! Once a year, KCA members share their best images and stories with the group. KCA is blessed with some truly gifted photographers: You won't want to miss this meeting! Photos don't have to be of birds. Any nature subject is fine. Mammals, reptiles, amphibians, insects, flowers, landscapes—the world is your oyster. To expedite the presentation, I will put all the images into a PowerPoint presentation before the meeting. However, you're also welcome to put your images on a thumb drive and bring it to the meeting. Either way, we'll get you in!

Wednesday, Oct. 12, 7 p.m., Swallows of Kane County, John Sprovieri Hickory Knolls Discovery Center, St. Charles.

During the summer, swallows are a common sight all over North America—from Alaska to south Florida. These graceful birds swoop and glide for hours chasing insects in flight. Most are very sociable, nesting communally and gathering in flocks on roadside wires. They are often found close to people, nesting around barns, houses and other man-made structures. This presentation—generously illustrated by photos from KCA members—will teach you all about the six swallow species that are seen in Kane County. You'll learn about their diets, breeding habits and migration patterns. You'll also get tips on how to identify swallows and where and when to see them.



Wednesday, Nov. 9, 7 p.m., Birding the Bog, Richard Hoeg, volunteer naturalist, Friends of Sax Zim Bog Hickory Knolls Discovery Center, St. Charles.

A retired computer programmer, Rich Hoeg lives near Duluth, MN. A photographer, blogger and author of children's books, Hoeg is a volunteer naturalist at Sax-Zim Bog, one of the premier winter birding areas in North America. It's home to some amazing birds, like Great Grey Owl, Northern Hawk Owl, and Evening Grosbeak. In this presentation, Hoeg will take us on a tour of the bog, only without the sub-zero temperatures! Whether you've been to the bog—or plan to someday—you won't want to miss this talk.

Wednesday, Dec. 14, 7 p.m., BCN Trends Analysis, Diann Bilderback, vice president, Bird Conservation Network Hickory Knolls Discovery Center, St. Charles.

Earlier this year, the Bird Conservation Network (BCN) released the results of a 22-year study showing that northeastern Illinois is a stronghold for breeding birds. The study, "Breeding Bird Trends in the Chicago Region 1999-2020," provides an update on the status of more than 100 nesting species across grassland, shrubland, wetland and woodland habitats. The report shows that some breeding bird species are stable or expanding, while others face declines. A coalition of 21 conservation organizations dedicated to the preservation of birds and the habitats they need to survive, BCN collected the data from six counties: Cook, Lake, McHenry, DuPage, Kane and Will. This presentation will detail the results of the study and its implications for Kane County.
